FOREWORD



According to the African Union Commission, Africa has the youngest population in the world with more than 400 million young people between the ages of 15 to 35 years. Per this estimation, young Africans are expected to constitute about 42% of the world's youth population by 2030.

In Ghana, the youth make up 36 percent of the population and 56 percent of these youth live in urban areas (World Bank Report, 2020). As the proportion of youth continues to grow, opportunities abound to harness this demographic dividend to boost socio-economic growth. The untapped potential of Ghana's growing youth population can only be unlocked through smart policies alongside strategic investments and enabling environment for growth.

The integration of the Ghanaian youth (15-35 years) into full and productive employment can be an important driver for growth and sustainable development. The inability to improve labour productivity in the country, however, continues to limit the performance of firms and enterprises across different economic sectors.

The Private Enterprise Federation (PEF) and its 19 Business Associations and Chambers in partnership with other private sector business groups representing the private sector in Ghana have through a myriad of events and activities constantly provided sustainable job opportunities for the youth in Ghana.

Private sector as the largest sector that creates employment in Ghana constantly decry the skills mismatch resulting from poorly targeted training and capacity development. Skills development for the labour force and the youth, in particular, are therefore, critical agenda for the country's development.

The Government of Ghana on the other hand aims to address the challenges of job creation, poverty reduction and sustainable development through diversification, technological upgrading and value addition in labour-intensive sectors.

Studies by Christabel E. Dadzie, Mawuko Fumey and Suleiman Namara in World Bank report indicate that over the last two decades, the government of Ghana has rolled out several interventions to address youth unemployment and under-employment. The current guiding policy, the Coordinated Programme of Economic and Social Development Policies (2017–24); as an Agenda for Jobs—Creating Prosperity and Equal Opportunity for All, places the issues of youth unemployment and under-employment at the center of national development.

The fulcrum of this Agenda is the Youth Employment Agency (YEA). The Agency has made great strides in promoting job opportunities for a lot of Ghanaian youth and I dare say that if other employment-oriented Agencies follow this route, unemployment would be reduced to the barest minimum.

This document highlights some efforts of the Agency in promoting job creation and opportunities to garner support of all stakeholders i.e. public and private sector, development partners, NGOs, etc in combining efforts to solve unemployment and increase productivity in Ghana.

The Agency has for some time now been focused on employment components such as entrepreneurial development, private sector competitiveness, linking agriculture to the other sectors of the economy, research and innovation, vocational and technical skills development, productivity improvement, collaboration with the Labour Department to harness opportunities in labour migration and the green economy, among others.

As the sector ministry with the oversight responsibility of supervising the implementation and coordination of these components, I, as the Minister can say the Ministry is excited about the Agency's programming and activities all of which are progressive and innovative and aimed at bringing relief to the young people of Ghana.

I am enthused about the growth in diversity of thought and the number of sustainable and skilled jobs that have been created. It has been a result-oriented Agency, delivering on huge socio-economic interventions and impacting on hundreds of thousands of young people. So far, in its life-span, the Agency has touched about a million young lives. It has been a springboard for hurdles, a torch in the darkness and a great starter for lots of young people.

The YEA Story

The government of Ghana recognised the problem of youth unemployment and implemented initiatives such as the Skills Training and Employment Placement Programme (STEP) and the Technical, Vocational, and Education Training Policy (TVET). In response to the escalating issue, the National Youth Employment Programme (NYEP) was launched in November 2006, aiming to provide decent employment opportunities and address poverty reduction, healthcare, education and governance.

Youth Employment Agency (YEA) and the Transition

National Youth Employment Programme (NYEP) To tackle the high rate of youth unemployment, the government built a comprehensive database of unemployed youth across the country. NYEP was contributing to Ghana's sustainable subsequently launched as a stop-gap creation measure. It introduced various employment modules to alleviate youth hardships, taking into consideration social, economic, political, religious and ethnic factors.

Reforms were carried out to enhance control mechanisms and expand the programme's scope. This led to the transition from the NYEP to the Ghana Youth Employment and Entrepreneurial Development Agency (GYEEDA).

Ghana Youth Employment and Entrepreneurship Development Agency (GYEEDA)

In 2012, the NYEP underwent a review to strengthen it's operations to incorporate entrepreneurship. Consequently, it was renamed the Ghana Youth Employment and Entrepreneurial Development Agency (GYEEDA).

Youth Employment Agency as a Public Service Agency In 2013, management challenges prompted the appointment of an Impact Assessment and Review Committee. The 5-Member Committee recommended the establishment of Youth Employment Agency (YEA) as a public service organisation, backed by a legislative instrument in 2015. Thus, YEA came into existence under the Youth Employment Agency Act 2015, (Act 887) with the mandate to empower the youth between the ages of 15-35 years through job creation to enable them to contribute meaningfully to the sustainable socio-economic development of the nation.











The core mandate of YEA is to oversee the development, coordination, supervision and facilitation of employment for the youth and related matters in Ghana.



MISSION

The Mission of the Agency is to lead the coordination of employment opportunities and the creation of jobs for the youth in Ghana.





VISION

The Agency envisions being an outstanding Public Sector Agency facilitating and creating sustainable employment opportunities for the youth nationwide.







Pursuing the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)

Youth Employment Agency (YEA) actively integrates the SDGs in its mission to promote youth employment and empower young people.

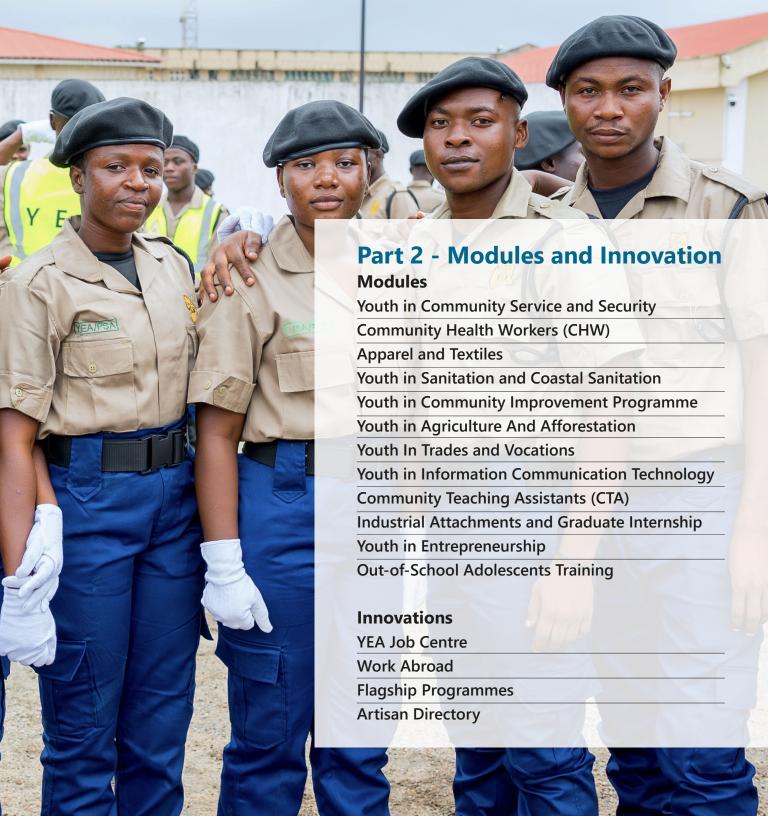
Goal 17 Partnerships For The Goals

Modules

The Traditional Modules of the Youth Employment Agency refer to the modules that are specifically prescribed by the Youth Employment Agency Regulations, Ll. 2231 of 2016.

While Regulation (1a) allows the Agency to develop and implement employment and career development modules to achieve its objectives, Regulation (1b) prescribes specific modules/programmes to be developed and implemented by the Agency.

These programmes classified as the Agency's traditional modules include;

- Youth in Community Service and Security Module
- Community Health Workers Module
- Apparel and Textiles Module
- Youth in Sanitation and Coastal Sanitation Module
- Youth in Community Improvement Programme
- Youth in Agriculture and Afforestation Module
- Youth in Trades and Vocations Module
- Youth in Information Communication Technology
- Community Teaching Assistants Module
- Industrial Attachments and Graduate Internship Module
- Youth in Entrepreneurship Module
- Out-of-School Adolescents Training Module

In compliance with our Legislative Instrument (LI 2231) of 2016, the Agency has performed creditably by implementing a majority of the prescribed modules. Over time, the Agency has provided transitional jobs, vocational skills training and start-up support spread across various modules to the youth of Ghana. Given the successes achieved with the implementation of these programmes, the Agency is encouraged and looking forward to doing more with the support of the Global and Ghanaian communites.

Objectives

Serve as a stop-gap measure for unemployed youth by providing temporary employment opportunities for the youth of Ghana.

Provide an opportunity for the youth to explore various career options.

Provide an avenue for skills development and acquisition.



Provide an opportunity for obtaining work experience to increase employability.

Provide opportunities for career and personal development.











Youth in Community Service and Security Module

The Youth in Community Service and Security is a module developed to augment the human resource capacity of Ghana's security agencies in communities. This provides the opportunity for the creation of job opportunities for the unemployed youth of Ghana. This module is implemented in collaboration with the various Security Agencies. These include:

Community Protection Assistants

The Community Protection Assistants (CPAs) programme is designed to engage and equip youth with basic policing skills to provide assistance to the Ghana Police Service and augment the shortfall in personnel. It provides an opportunity for the youth to experience the Police Service and decide on the possibility of pursuing it as a career.



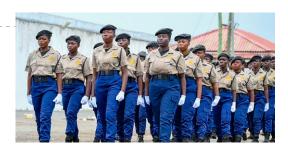
Youth in Fire Service

Youth in Fire Service is rolled out in collaboration with the Ghana Fire Service. The essence of this programme is to engage unemployed youth in various locations in the country to augment the labour force needs of the Ghana Fire Service. The youth engaged in this programme do not essentially participate in extinguishing fires; rather, they assist the Ghana Fire Service in educating the public about effective fire safety and prevention practices.



Prison Officers' Assistants

This is also a collaboration between the Youth Employment Agency and the Ghana Prisons Service as a means of augmenting its staff strength. Beneficiaries in this programme generally assist the Prison Officers in the management of the correctional facilities. However, those with artisanal skills work in the workshops.





Selection Process

















Community Health Workers Module

Every country's socio-economic progress depends on the health of its citizens. However, a presentation by the Ghana Health Service (GHS) to the Management of YEA revealed the shortage of medical staff which adversely affects health service delivery in the country. Seeing the opportunity, the Youth Employment Agency launched a scheme to give young people jobs in the health sector in various localities to address the shortage of health professionals in the sector.

> This module was therefore designed in collaboration with the Ghana Health Service to provide basic health care services in hard-to-reach communities aimed at achieving Sustainable Development Goal Three (3) "ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages"

Since its launch in February 2007, the module has seen slight modifications as a means of enhancing its impact on the community and beneficiaries. These modifications have mainly been in nomenclature, partnerships and targeted end-use: from 2007 to 2012, it was named Health Extension Workers (HEW) in partnership with Ghana Health Service with a focus on providing support services to professional nurses at medical facilities; from 2014 till date, it has been named Community Health Worker Programme to provide basic health care services to residents of the community in their homes.

Apparel and Textiles Module

This is a skill development programme targeted at training young people in garment and textile production to provide interested youth with the opportunity to be self-employed as well as create employment for other young people. Under the module, some youth are trained in the small-scale production of clothes (i.e. dressmaking/tailoring) while others are trained in the industrial production of clothes in partnership with the private sector. Some other youth are also trained in textile production with a specific focus on batik, tie and dye.







Youth in Sanitation and Coastal Sanitation Module

Sanitation, whether coastal or inland, is a major concern to society as a result of its impact on health and the aesthetics of the environment. With fast-growing urban areas characterized by increasing population, there is a high tendency for the production of large quantities of waste.

This situation requires concerted efforts on the part of government and citizens to put in place measures to ensure that waste is regularly cleared and collected. As part of strategies to manage waste in the country, especially urban areas, the Government of Ghana through the Youth Employment Agency and the Metropolitan, Municipal and District Assemblies partnered with Zoomlion Ghana Limited to implement the Youth in Waste and Sanitation Module in 2006.









Youth in Community Improvement Programme

This module encompasses all activities that improves social progress through sports, entertainment, social activities and many more. There are two major programmes rolled out under this module. Youth in Elite Sports and the School Support Programme.

Elite Sports

The Agency in collaboration with the National Sports Authority (NSA) embarks on the "Youth in Elite Sports" initiative to recruit unemployed young people to aid in the management of Ghana's sports facilities and general administration academically and practically.

Beneficiaries are placed under:

Pitch Management: Participants are trained and deployed to manage and maintain football fields. Federation Assistantships: Participants are trained in basic managerial skills in various sporting disciplines to assist the District Sports offices with sports development.

Fitness and Wellness: Participants are trained about healthy eating, exercise and weight control to support gyms and the entire athletic industry.

Coaching and Refereeing: The Appropriate International Sports Federation Level I Sports content is applied in this training. Participants can recognize and nurture young athletes and sports teams after completing the course.

Sports Journalism: Training is done on the fundamentals of broadcasting and sports journalism and can develop abilities in news gathering, radio presenting and broadcasting production after the programme.

School Support Programme

The School Support Programme (SSP) is a collaboration between Youth Employment Agency (YEA) and the Ghana Education Service (GES) to recruit Ghanaian youth to serve as auxiliary staff at the various Senior High Schools in the country. The programme has been instrumental in boosting the staff strength of the various SHSs across the country in the operational areas of Kitchen Assistants and School Guards.

Youth in Agriculture and Afforestation

This module aims to empower young people to start their farms and participate in the very lucrative Agricultural Value Chain while also providing them with career options in agriculture. As a response to issues of climate change and rapid deforestation in the country, the Agency partnered with the Forestry Commission to engage unemployed youth in various locations across the country to undertake reforestation, rehabilitation and protection while creating employment. The module was launched in 2018 and recruited beneficiaries with the core function of planting and tending to trees. Over a period of two years, the module contributed to the planting of 67.4 million seedlings which resulted in the restoration of 1,313 hectares of forest cover (Sarpong & Yeboah, 2022).

Youth in Trades and Vocations Module

Youth in Trades and Vocations has been introduced to provide a wide array of trades and vocations for the teeming unemployed youth to learn a preferred trade or vocation to secure their future. The module cuts across social and economic considerations for all Ghanaian youth irrespective of their background to learn a trade or vocation to eke-out a living.

Youth in Maritime is one of the programmes rolled out under this module to take advantage of job opportunities in Ghana's Oil and Gas industry. It was rolled out in partnership with the Maritime University to train unemployed youth as technicians to leverage Ghana's local content policy and work in the maritime industry. Beneficiaries are given training in various artisanal areas such as electrical, welding, carpentry, etc.









Youth in Information Communication Technology



The 21st century has witnessed technological advancement at an incredible rate and thereby generated new opportunities in the Information Technology sector for the establishment of businesses and job creation. This module is in recognition of these opportunities and sought to train the vouth to acquire various skills in the sector including production and repair of ICT equipment like computers and mobile phones, robotics, coding and the development of applications.

Community Teaching Assistants Module

The Community Teaching Assistants (CTA) module is in response to the need to fill vacancies in nurseries and basic schools in hard-to-reach communities where trained professional teachers are lacking. The objective is to create opportunities for a pool of young men and women with at least Second Cycle level education to help deliver pre and basic school level educational services in rural areas.

Under this module is Arabic Instructors, introduced by the Agency in response to the need to promote and whip up the interest of the youth in the Arabic Language as an examinable subject by the Ghana Education Service (GES) at the Basic Education Certificate Examination (BECE) and the West African Senior School Certificate Examination (WASSCE) Levels.







Industrial Attachments Module

The Paid Internships and Industrial Attachment module as the name suggests is tailored to cushion students on vacation during their internship and attachments to acquire the requisite knowledge and skills in their field of study. Having acquired competency in a particular discipline in school or college, the individual is exposed to the real work environment where they put into practice the knowledge and skills acquired in school.

The module also serves as a training ground for graduates from tertiary institutions to receive the relevant years' experience during the Two-Year Engagement service with the benefactor organization to meet the eligibility criteria to make them employable.

Youth in Entrepreneurship Module

This module is intended to assist the youth with unique business propositions within the Agency's mandated age bracket to enable them to establish businesses that have the potential of creating employment. The Agency is expected to provide both financing and technical assistance to ensure the growth and sustainability of the proposed business venture.

Out-of-School Adolescents Training Module

This module is focused on youth below employable age who are for one reason or the other no longer in formal education. The module aims to enrol such individuals in training programmes that would make them employable by the time they enter the employable age bracket.

YEA job Centre has over 700 employers with over 40,000 young people registered to either look for work or skill upgrades.

This employer / job seeker interface is flexible and operates on both web and smart devices thus making it versatile and easily accessible to all. The Al within this system interacts in real-time with job seekers, especially on jobs they are matched. There are also online chat systems and call centres to support its operations.







The Walk-in Centre

These are physical offices located in all regions with trained and well-groomed staff to provide a face to face support for job seekers and employers.



The Training Hub

The platform allows job seekers to take both virtual and physical training. The aim is to allow the youth to undertake skills upgrade training, grooming and to interact with the online job market.

The Work Abroad Programme (WAP) is an innovative intervention by YEA to harness international opportunities for jobs, internships and training for the youth of Ghana.

Objectives

- Promote safe, regular and orderly avenues for labour migration.
- Assist potential migrants make informed positive choices through the provision of information, guidance and support.
- Reduce the effect of poverty and social exclusion among the vulnerable youth in Ghana.
- Bring together government, stakeholders and civil society to establish mechanisms that balance their various interests and address the needs of the youth of Ghana.
- Preserve the dignity and security of the working Ghanaian youth while abroad.
- Enable beneficiary youth to obtain exposure and employable skills for future job prospects.
- Guide and offer legal and civic support services to quicken their integration in the host country.
- Contribute to the establishment of a comprehensive database on migration.
- Foster an effective and seamless reintegration of beneficiaries into Ghana.

Periodic & routine monitoring of work conditions

To ensure that youth who, through this programme, travel abroad to work are treated well, WAP monitors beneficiaries through the processes below:

- Registration with Ghana's embassies/foreign missions abroad.
- Liasing with Ministry of Foreign Affairs & b. Regional Integration requesting a contact person to be an eye on the migrants abroad.
- Virtual monitoring, where tracking C. systems are available and they can easily contact us.
- d. Quarterly request for monitoring reports on the performance & welfare of migrants.

Reintegration of Returning Youth

The Agency would take active steps to secure jobs with partners and explore entrepreneurship opportunities towards reintegrating returnees.









Flagship Programmes

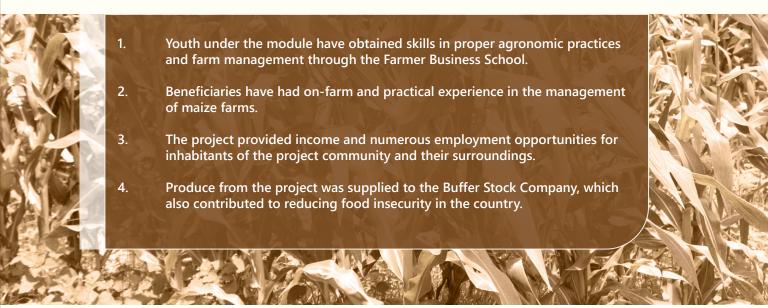
This concept thrives on harnessing local resources and potential in developing region-specific interventions for addressing youth unemployment. By way of leveraging the competitive advantages of each region, the agriculture sector remains indispensable. As a result, the regional flagship programmes present a relatively sustainable venture where the unique advantages of each region are carefully and thoroughly explored to the advantage of Ghanaian youth.

The concept focuses on developing programmes that would engage at least fifty-thousand (50,000) youth in projects that would create sustainable jobs and as well serve as exit options for beneficiaries exiting some of the traditional modules.

Flagship Phase I (Pilot): Maize Production Project in Branam, Wenchi

The initiative commenced with a pilot of maize cultivation on a 250-acre farmland at Branam, located within the Wenchi municipality in the newly created Bono Region, to train 100 young farmers. The project started from July 2019 to January 2020, undergoing various phases, such as land preparation, beneficiary recruitment, farmer business school, planting, post-planting, harvesting and storage.

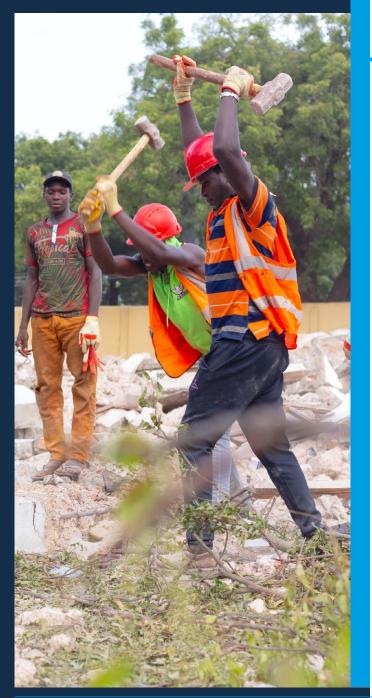

The Artisan Directory is an integrated skill development and market facilitation programme that seeks to train the youth in different artisanal skill areas and also links these young artisans to prospective clients via a digital platform (Mobile App).

The goal for the introduction of this programme is the creation/facilitation of jobs for the youth through employable skills development, entrepreneurship support (start-ups) and market access for artisanal services in Ghana and beyond.

All prospective Beneficiaries will be required to submit themselves to be trained and certified under the guidance of the Technical and Vocational Education and Training Service (TVET).

Youth trained under this programme would not be required to buy their tools because they will be provided by the Agency at no cost to them.



Market Facilitation

Beneficiaries of this programme would not have to worry about where to find clients because the Artisan Directory App has been set up purposely to find, manage and make clients available to them.



Target Market

Estate Developers, Construction firms, Facility Management firms, Mining and Petrochemical Industry Firms, Educational & Health Facility Managers and Individual Households.



Skill Areas Under Focus

Brick Production, Brick Laying, Masonry, Carpentry/Woodworks, Tiling, Plumbing, General Electricals, Plasterboard Installation, Landscaping, Interior Decor, Steelworks, Aluminum Fabrication, Painting works, Beauty Care Skills such as Dressmaking, Hairdressing and Cosmetology among others.



Expected number of Beneficiaries

The Agency is targeting to recruit, train, support and make about twelve thousand (12,000) young artisans in various fields available to the consuming public by December, 2023.



Funding Sources

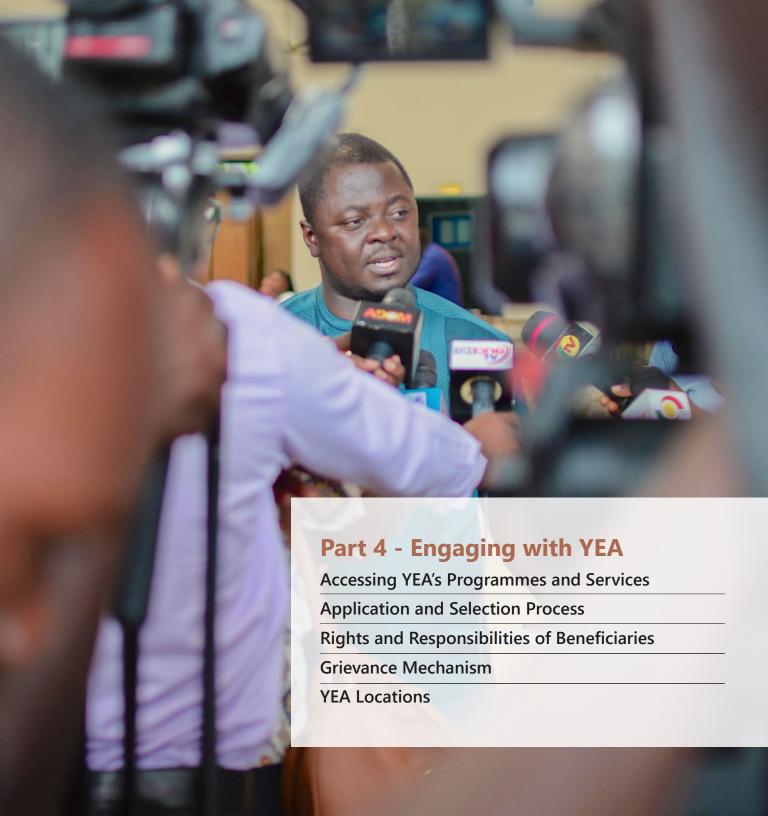

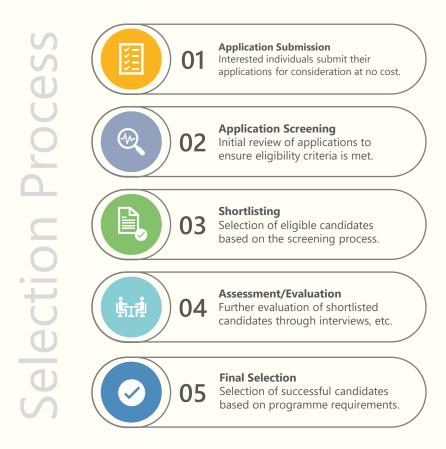








The selection process involves reviewing the applications and assessing the suitability of candidates based on predetermined criteria. This process may include interviews, assessments or reference checks. The selection committee will carefully evaluate each application and select candidates who demonstrate the potential to benefit from and contribute to the specific programme or service.

Inclusivity

Regulation 6(a & b) of LI. 2231 places a responsibility on the Agency to ensure that the needs of Persons With Disabilities (PWDs) are considered in the development of modules and where necessary a special module could be developed for Persons With Disabilities (PWDs). To operationalize this requirement, the Agency has established a unit for Gender and Persons With Disability whose duty it is to ensure that modules/programmes comply fully with this regulation to pass for implementation. Beyond setting up the Unit, Management has further instituted a 30% quota reserved for the vulnerable group to be able to receive placement into our programmes.

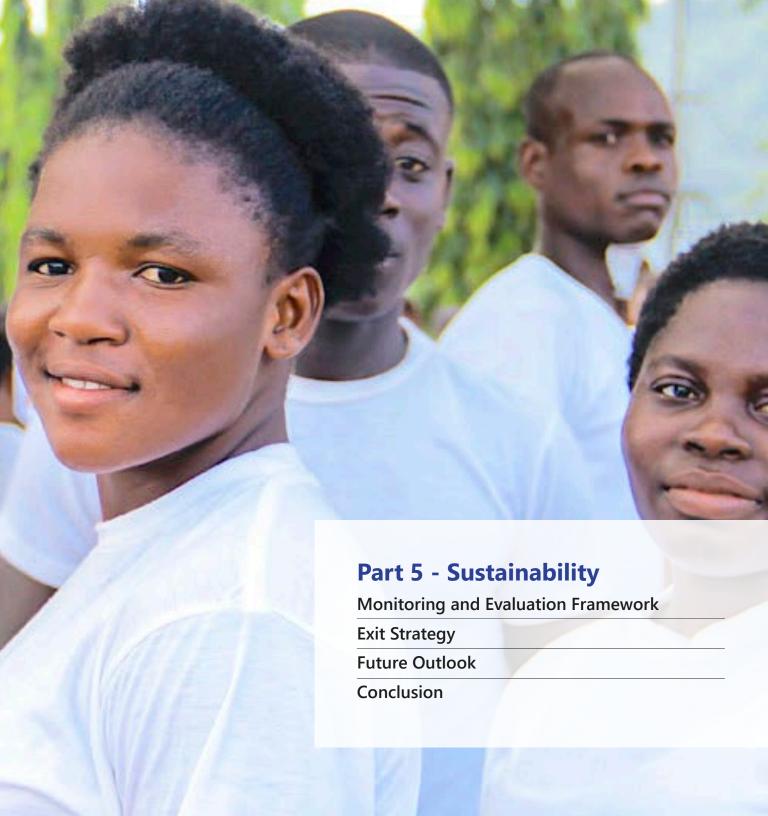

Monitoring and Evaluation Framework

Monitoring progress and impact is a crucial aspect of YEA's commitment to accountability and continuous improvement. YEA employs robust monitoring systems and tools to track the implementation of its programmes, measure key performance indicators and gather relevant data. Regular monitoring enables the Agency to assess progress toward its goals, identify any challenges or bottlenecks and take corrective actions as needed. By closely monitoring initiatives, the Agency ensures that resources are utilized effectively and that the intended outcomes are being achieved. YEA also conducts impact assessments to understand the broader social and economic changes resulting from its interventions. These assessments help measure the long-term effects of YEA's programmes, such as job creation, income generation, community development and sustainable entrepreneurship.

Exit Strategy

It is a prerequisite for all modules/programme concepts to demonstrate possible avenues for exiting Beneficiaries to remain employed after life with YEA either as a monthly allowance earner, a vocational skills trainee or an entrepreneurship support Beneficiary. For Beneficiaries who come under our traditional modules, a well-negotiated arrangement has been instituted to mainstream them into their user Agencies/Organizations. This has seen the mainstreaming of Beneficiaries into Agencies particularly the security services where they were posted to serve. In the case of the Job Centre, successful job seekers get direct placement into permanent jobs. The programme, however is structured to monitor performance and provide re-training support services to improve productivity skills and to ensure that they continue to keep their jobs. Beneficiaries under the Artisan Directory and the Flagship programmes receive start-up support to start their own micro and small-scale Artisanal business or farms where applicable to ensure that they remain permanently employed. Any programme or concept that fails to demonstrate a clear exit path is not considered or accepted by the Agency and no resources are committed to such programmes.



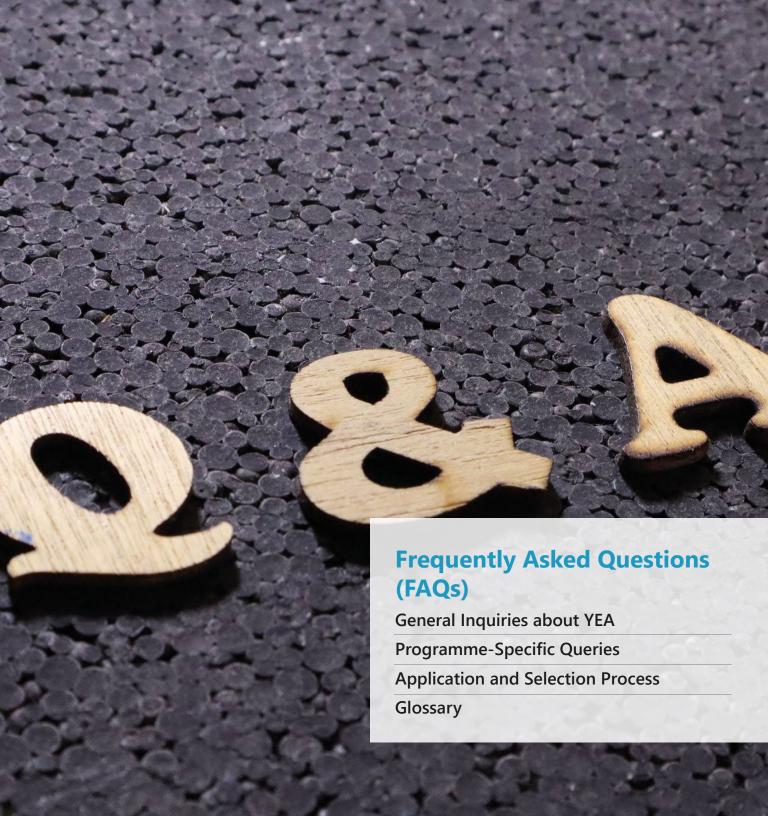

General Inquiries about YEA
